Today's topic is about [the] Spanish word "Pura vida". Let's begin!

If you visit Costa Rica, you will undoubtedly come across the words *pura vida* at some point, whether that's on the colorful hand-[painted] signs that are ubiquitous across the country or when friendly staff welcome you to any restaurant, hotel or shop. It's so [embedded] in local culture that in November 2023, the phrase was included in the global Spanish dictionary compiled by the Royal Spanish Academy (RAE) in Madrid for the first time.

In English, *pura vida* can be directly translated as "pure life". While, according to the RAE definition, it can describe a person as nice or friendly or relate to good health, it can also express agreement, describe something as good, or serve as a greeting or farewell. But it is so much more than this to Costa Ricans; it's a shared identity, a feeling of optimism, and a uniquely positive outlook on life. A Costa Rican woman grew up surrounded by the phrase, but after nearly five years living in London, she realised that I felt disconnected from its meaning. On a trip back to Costa Rica to visit her family and friends, she wanted to rediscover *pura vida* by finding out what it means to others and see if she could feel it again.
