Hello, welcome back to another PR2 movie!

As requested, here is the sequel to my previous movie on confident speakers. Last time, we covered eye contact and gestures. That was how to "look" confident, so today we're learning how to "sound" confident.

First and foremost, eliminate filler words including "um", "ah", "like", and "you know?" The excessive use of filler words can make speakers sound unsure of themselves. It takes practice, but cutting these filler words will significantly improve your speaking skills. Try recording yourself presenting and you'll be shocked at how many filler words you use – that's what happened to me when I filmed my first movie here.

Also, don't be afraid to take a short pause. Most people use filler words because they're afraid of silence. It takes confidence to use dramatic pauses. A pause gives your audience a break between thoughts.

It is a great idea to choose one or two phrases in your next presentation that express the key message you want to leave your audience with. Pause before you deliver those lines. In the same way, confident speakers vary the pace of their speech. They slow down and speed up to accentuate their most important points. 150 to 160 words per minute is slow enough to be understood, but not so fast that the listener struggles to keep up.
