However, in ancient times, there were many seasonal traditions, such as New Year's visits to shrines, Japanese apricot blossoms in early spring, and wisteria in early summer. The tradition of cherry blossom viewing began to stand out distinctly, possibly around the late 19th century. The groundwork for this was laid around the 17th century. During the Edo period – early 17th century to mid-late 19th century – what we might now call mini-trips, where commoners in Edo ventured out together to famous [cherry] blossom viewing spots such as Ueno's Kaneiji Temple, Sumida River's embankment, and Asukayama Park, gave rise to a culture of communal gatherings and feasting. And in the mid-19th century, the emergence of 'Somei-yoshino' also contributed to this trend. 'Somei-yoshino' grow quickly, allowing for the creation of cherry blossom viewing spots with minimal effort, which greatly contributed to the popularization of hanami. Also, with the development of transportation networks such as railways, individuals could journey longer distances, facilitating large gatherings at cherry blossom viewing spots. Hanami gained widespread popularity from the late 19th century onward as a result.
