Kyoto, a beloved tourist hub, is grappling with challenges stemming from a surge in visitors, which impacts locals and the environment negatively. This influx, previously curbed by COVID-19, now brings back issues like overcrowded public transport and conflicts. To combat this, the city government introduced measures last autumn.
