The English proficiency of public junior and senior high school students in Japan is continuing to improve, an Education Ministry survey showed May 9th. The proportion of third year junior high schools with English skills equivalent to grade 3 or higher in the Eiken proficiency tests rose to 50% in the fiscal 2023 survey, up 0.8 percentage point from the previous year. The share of third year senior high school students with English skills equivalent to grade pre-2 or higher Eiken levels was up 1.9 points at 50.6%.

Ah yes, so I was wondering what it was referring to when it mentioned improved proficiency, and it turns out that it was merely referring to Eiken scores. Of course, this is still a positive improvement and of course, passing your Eiken tests is very important and very commendable, but as we know, the Eiken test itself is not an entirely accurate indication of developing English skills overall.
