In 1964, Nelson Mandela was convicted of treason against his country, South Africa Narrowly escaping the death penalty, the forty-six-year-old lawyer instead was sentenced to life in prison on an island near Cape Town. Mandela's crime had been to organize resistance against South Africa's racist laws known collectively as apartheid. Apartheid, meaning "apartness", denied black South Africans – three-fourths of the country's population – many political rights, keeping them legally inferior to the white minority.
