On the subject of staying safe, one of the biggest stories to hit the Japanese news cycle recently was the suspension of the "Go To Travel" campaign. Japan will suspend its "Go To Travel" subsidy program in areas with a high number of coronavirus cases, Prime Minister Yoshihide Suga said November 21st, in a policy reversal. Suga's approach has been criticized for focusing too much on stimulating the economy amid record numbers of infections. The decision was made as Japan confirmed more than 2,500 new daily cases of the novel coronavirus, marking a record high for the fourth day in a row, and a day after a government panel of medical experts proposed reviewing the campaign aimed at promoting domestic tourism.

Hmm, this line about the prime minister prioritizing boosting the economy over the health and safety of individual citizens is something that I've always been concerned about, and so I'm glad I'm not the only one who noticed.
