Recently, a group of scientists working in South Africa announced the discovery of the fossilized remains of a new hominid species. Hominids are the name given to the predecessors and close relatives of human beings who lived millions of years ago but later became extinct. Fossils of hominids are scant and so this discovery is quite important for scientists trying to retrace the evolutionary sequence that led to human beings. The new species has an anatomy quite different from that of other remains that have been found, and it is, in the estimation of most specialists, a major advance in recovering the history of hominid evolution.

The first fossil was discovered accidentally. Dr. Lee R. Berger, an American paleontologist, was engaged in the exploration of caves in an area of South Africa known as the Cradle of Humankind. His son, Matthew, was playing nearby and fell over a log and discovered some fossilized bones. His father immediately saw their importance.
