One way to improve the standard of treatment, according to Baker, is to establish a new accreditation system for institutions offering programs in clinical psychology. He specifically targets for-profit schools. Baker feels these schools – which usually have no connection to universities – do not offer enough scientific training. This, he says, explains why graduates of these schools are less likely to practice scientifically proven treatments than holders of a university-granted Ph.D. in clinical psychology. Again, there is a strong similarity to medicine prior to the 20<sup>th</sup> century, when many doctors in the United States received their qualifications from “diploma mills”. These were institutions that offered little scientific training and so were accused of basically selling medical degrees. In the end, a group of scientifically trained doctors formed an organization that campaigned for the improvement of substandard medical schools and the introduction of strict accreditation requirements, which were eventually put in place. Baker hopes the field of psychology will follow a similar path.
