The most important 18th century Druid was Edward Williams. A political activist, who advocated the ideals of the French Revolution, Williams also passed himself off as the last member of a secret society of Welsh Druids. He cooked up various mystical beliefs and rites, and a surprising number of people fell for his claims. Through the 19th century, the Druid movement grew, even spreading to the United States. During the first half of the 20th century, however, the movement began to dry up. With fewer and fewer recruits, it looked as though it might fade away completely. Then, in the 1960s, with the hippie movement, it experienced a big revival.

Contemporary Druid beliefs are a fusion of ancient Celtic myths and the beliefs of more exotic societies. The Druids believe strongly that trees and animals have as much right to exist as people. This makes the Druids passionate believers in nature conservation, intervening to protect the countryside from [the] ravages of developers.
