Fans of Mobile Suit Gundam plastic scale models can now recycle the unwanted frames by giving them to the toymaker, Bandai Namco Holdings Incorporated. Hobbyists can leave the plastic frames at about 190 collection points across Japan. The collection points are in model shops and game centers run by Bandai Namco. The company plans to reuse the discarded plastic waste to make other plastic products, including more of the Gundam scale models. Bandai Namco said it uses about 7,000 tons of plastic every year to make its flagship Gundam plastic models. Up to 2,000 tons of that plastic is frame waste. "Gunpla is a product much loved by many people, so we launched this recycling project with a desire to create a sustainable society together with fans," a spokeswoman said.
