Eric Carle, author and illustrator of the beloved children's classic *The Very Hungry Caterpillar*, has died aged 91, according to a statement from his official Instagram account on May 26<sup>th</sup>. The book, first published in 1969, features a caterpillar that eats its way through many different foods on different days of the week before finally emerging as a butterfly. With its distinctive artwork and subtle educational concepts, the 224-word book has been translated into 66 languages and sold more than 50 million copies worldwide.
