According to this group, in short, the benefits of globalization vary too much from country to country.

Proponents of critical globalism take a disinterested view of the process, simply examining its processes and effects. Critical globalism refers to the critical engagement with globalization processes, neither blocking them out nor celebrating globalization. \*Thus, while critical globalists see that globalization has often sustained poverty, \*widened material inequalities, increased ecological degradation, sustained militarism, fragmented communities, marginalized minority groups, fed intolerance, and deepened crises of democracy, they also see that it has had a positive effect on the great rise of the average individual income since 1945, reducing the population in miserable poverty, increasing ecological consciousness, and facilitating disarmament.

Academically, globalization covers such disciplines as international relations, political geography, economics, sociology, communication studies, agricultural, ecological, and cultural studies.
