Remains of a toothless, two-legged dinosaur species that lived some 70 million years ago have been discovered in Brazil, researchers said November 18<sup>th</sup>, calling them a "very rare" find. The small dinosaur, which measured about a meter long and 80 centimeters tall, is a theropod, a group whose members were almost all believed to be carnivores.
