Stoke-on-Trent, in the heart of England, has a reputation in the country for poverty, but Stokies are incredibly proud of their heritage. It's the childhood home of R.J. Mitchell, the man who designed the Spitfire, one of the most successful British fighter planes of World War Two. A Spitfire made in 1945 sits in the Potteries Museum. Stoke-on-Trent is well known for its pottery, and you can learn more about that at the Gladstone Pottery Museum. You'll spot the distinctive shape of the kilns – called "bottle ovens" – from a mile away. Next, it's a visit to Trentham Estate, which was demolished in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century but has since seen a lot of renovation. Its gardens are a lovely walk.
