The world's wildlife may be in more trouble than scientists have so far reported, new research published in the journal *Communications Biology* on August 4th suggests. While scientists have assessed the status of more than 147,000 plants and animals, there are thousands of species considered too data deficient for a full assessment. As a result, those species haven't been included in the listing of Threatened or Endangered Species updated each year by the International Union for the Conservation of Nature. Among those under-assessed species are the killer whale, along with the pink fairy armadillo of Argentina and nearly 200 bat species worldwide.
