At least 150 critically endangered vultures were poisoned to death in separate incidents in Botswana and South Africa, conservationists said August 12th, warning the killings pushed the birds closer to extinction. Vulture poisoning is not uncommon in wildlife-rich southern Africa, where they are targeted by poachers because they draw unwanted attention to their illegal activities. In the latest incidents, more than 50 white-backed vultures were found dead in Botswana's northern Chobe district, while about 100 more were discovered in South Africa's Kruger National Park on August 11th.
