Ancient crocodiles, long thought to have walked on all fours like their modern day cousins, may have got around on two legs, according to new research published June 11<sup>th</sup>. Researchers analyzed footprints found at the Jinju Formation in modern day South Korea, a rich archaeological dig site that has led to the discovery of ancient species of lizards, spiders, and tiny raptors dating back 120 million years. They believe the footprints may have been made by a 3-meter-long crocodile ancestor that walked around "like a crocodile balancing on a tightrope," according to Kyung Soo Kim from the Chinju National University of Education.
