Today's story isn't about some new paleontological discover, unfortunately, but it is still rather positive news I think, which is nice, isn't it? So, take a listen:

Australia plans to create a marine park almost the size of Spain around remote islands off its southeast coast, the government announced June 4th. Under the proposals, the existing Macquarie Island Marine Park will be tripled in size, bringing a total of 475,465 square kilometres under protection. That is an area roughly the size of Spain or Cameroon and much larger than Japan. The protections mean the area will be "completely closed to fishing, mining, and other extractive activities," according to Environment Minister Tanya Plisbersek. Macquarie Island sits halfway between Australia and Antarctica.

Ah, so that's quite good news, isn't it? It's surprising how few areas of the world are completely closed off to human activity, and so I think we should be doing more to create these large, untouchable areas where nature is allowed to thrive unimpeded and unbothered.
