Recently, I received my first mosquito bite of the year, and I was raged at how agonizingly itchy it was, so let's learn about the mechanism of them!

In very simple terms, mosquitoes, precisely female mosquitoes, perform mini surgery on us. They search for blood to form eggs, and accurately locate its source using a receptor that detects the carbon dioxide we breathe out, as well as skin odorants from perspiration and lactic acid.
