Winston Churchill was a British politician who led his country to victory during World War 2. Prior to the war, Churchill was widely considered a failure. His career had been practically finished after he was blamed for British missteps during World War 1. He had served in the Cabinet in the 1920s, but by the time Adolf Hitler and his Nazi Party took power in Germany, Churchill was warming a seat on the backbenches, his warnings about Hitler's rise ignored by colleagues who thought Churchill was an alarmist crank. Britain turned to Churchill at one of the country's darkest hours. At the beginning of World War 2, Neville Chamberlain, the leader of the Conservative Party, was the prime minister. He resigned in 1940 when it became clear that he was not up for the job of leading his country in a desperate war for survival. Churchill replaced him at 10 Downing Street, the traditional residence of the British prime minister.
