It's already November and some people are already decorating their homes with Christmas lights, but hold up! We need to celebrate Thanksgiving first. Thanksgiving is an American holiday often associated with Native Americans, turkey, and pumpkin pie. Today we'll learn about the colonizer's story, and next time we'll study the Native Americans' story.

In 1620, colonists departed Plymouth, England on a small ship called the Mayflower. It carried 102 passengers--religious separatists, who were seeking a new home where they could freely practice their religion. Their journey to the New World lasted 66 days.

After finally reaching present-day Massachusetts, however, the colonists, or Pilgrims, suffered from exposure, scurvy, and outbreaks of contagious disease. It was a brutal winter, and only half of the 102 settlers survived.

In March, after moving ashore, they were greeted by a member of the Abenaki tribe. He and another Native American taught these poor Pilgrims how to fish, cultivate corn, extract sap from maple trees, and avoid poisonous plants.

After a successful corn harvest in November 1621, Governor William Bradford organized a celebratory feast with the Native American allies. This is the origin of Thanksgiving. The festival lasted for an entire three days.
